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Introduction

Summary of planned audit work

- 1. This document summarises the work plan for our 2021/22 external audit of Inverclyde Council. The main elements of our work include:
- evaluation of the key controls within the main accounting systems
- an audit of the 2021/22 annual accounts and provision of an Independent Auditor's Report
- an audit opinion on other statutory information published within the annual report and accounts including the Management Commentary, the Governance Statement and the Remuneration Report
- consideration of arrangements in relation to the audit dimensions: financial management, financial sustainability, governance and transparency and value for money that frame the wider scope of public sector audit
- consideration of Best Value arrangements
- providing assurance on the Housing Benefit Subsidy Claim, Non-Domestic Rates Return and the Whole of Government Accounts (WGA) return
- review Inverclyde Council's arrangements for preparing and publishing statutory performance information
- review Inverclyde Council's participation in the National Fraud Initiative.

Impact of Covid-19

- 2. The coronavirus disease (Covid-19) pandemic has had a significant impact on public services and public finances, and the effects will be felt well into the future.
- 3. The Auditor General for Scotland, the Accounts Commission and Audit Scotland continue to assess the risks to public services and finances from Covid-19 across the full range of our audit work, including annual audits and the programme of performance audits. The well-being of audit teams and the delivery of high-quality audits remain paramount. Changes in our approach may be necessary and where this impacts on annual audits, revisions to this Annual Audit Plan may be required.

Adding value

4. We aim to add value to Inverclyde Council through our external audit work by being constructive and forward looking, by identifying areas for improvement and by recommending and encouraging good practice. In so doing, we will help Inverclyde Council promote improved standards of governance, better management and

decision making and more effective use of resources. Additionally, we attend meetings of the Audit Committee and actively participate in discussions.

Respective responsibilities of the auditor and Inverciyde Council

5. The Code of Audit Practice (2016) sets out in detail the respective responsibilities of the auditor and Inverclyde Council. Key responsibilities are summarised below.

Auditor responsibilities

- **6.** Our responsibilities as independent auditors are established by the Local Government (Scotland) Act 1973 and the Code of Audit Practice (including supplementary guidance) and guided by the Financial Reporting Council's Ethical Standard
- 7. Auditors in the public sector give an independent opinion on the financial statements and other information within the annual report and accounts. We also review and report on the arrangements within the audited body to manage its performance, regularity and use of resources. In doing this, we aim to support improvement and accountability.

Inverclyde Council's responsibilities

- 8. Inverclyde Council is responsible for maintaining accounting records and preparing financial statements that give a true and fair view.
- 9. Inverclyde Council has the primary responsibility for ensuring the proper financial stewardship of public funds, compliance with relevant legislation and establishing effective arrangements for governance, propriety and regularity that enable them to deliver their objectives.

Managing the transition to 2022/23 audits

10. Audit appointments are usually for five years but were extended to six years due to Covid-19. 2021/22 is the final year of the current appointment and we will work closely with our successors to ensure a well-managed transition.

Financial statements audit planning

Materiality

11. Materiality is an expression of the relative significance of a matter in the context of the financial statements as a whole. We are required to plan our audit to determine with reasonable confidence whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement. The assessment of what is material is a matter of professional judgement over both the amount and the nature of the misstatement.

Materiality levels for the 2021/22 audit

12. We assess materiality at different levels as described in Exhibit 1. The materiality values for Inverclyde Council are set out in Exhibit 1.

Exhibit 1 2021/22 Materiality levels for Inverciyde Council and its group

Materiality	Amount
Planning materiality – This is the figure we calculate to assess the overall impact of audit adjustments on the financial statements. It has been set at 1% of gross expenditure for the year ended 31 March 2022 based on the latest audited financial statements for 2020/21.	£3.6 million
Performance materiality – This acts as a trigger point. If the aggregate of errors identified during the financial statements audit exceeds performance materiality, this would indicate that further audit procedures should be considered. Using our professional judgement, we have assessed performance materiality at 50% of planning materiality.	
Reporting threshold (clearly trivial) – We are required to report to those charged with governance on all unadjusted misstatements more than the 'reporting threshold' amount. This has been calculated at 3% of planning materiality and rounded to a memorable metric.

Significant risks of material misstatement to the financial statements

- **13.** Our risk assessment draws on our cumulative knowledge of Inverclyde Council, its major transaction streams, key systems of internal control and risk management processes. Also, it is informed by our discussions with management, meetings with internal audit, attendance at committees and a review of supporting information.
- 14. Based on our risk assessment process, we identified the following significant risks of material misstatement to the financial statements. These are risks which have the greatest impact on our planned audit procedures. Exhibit 2 summarises the nature of the risk, the sources of assurance from management arrangements and the further audit procedures we plan to perform to gain assurance over the risk.

Significant risk of material misstatement

Sources of assurance

Planned audit response

- Substantive testing of income and expenditure transactions around the year-end to confirm they are accounted for in the correct financial year.
- Focussed testing of accounting accruals and prepayments.

2. Estimation in the valuation of land and buildings.

Inverclyde Council held land and buildings with a NBV of £542 million as at 31 March 2021, with land and buildings revaluated on a five-year rolling basis. An external valuer carries out valuations of land and buildings.

There is a significant degree of subjectivity in the valuation of land and buildings. Valuations are based on specialist and management assumptions and changes in these can result in material changes to valuations.

We have been advised that the council will apply indexation to land and buildings for 2021/22.

There is a risk that valuations will change significantly in 2021/22 and create material uncertainty over assets not subject to revaluation.

Indexation is being used for all assets not specifically subject to valuation in 2021/22, indexation will be based on advice from the Council's external. professional, valuers who were responsible for valuation of the full estate in 2020/21. As such the risk of material movements in the 2021/22 valuations is not considered significant. From 2022/23 the Council intends to move to a rolling programme of valuations across the entire asset portfolio which will further reduce the impact of valuation movements within any single financial year.

- Review the information provided to the external valuer to assess for completeness.
- Evaluate the competence, capabilities, and objectivity of the professional valuer.
- Complete a walkthrough of the valuation process to obtain an understanding of the process. including the methodologies and assumptions applied.
- Review the reports from the valuer to confirm overall asset valuation movements.
- Obtain an understanding of the management's involvement in the valuation process to assess if appropriate oversight has occurred.
- Examine management's assessment of any assets not revalued in 2021/22 against evidence of changes in other revalued assets.
- Test the reconciliation between the financial ledger and the property asset register.
- Sample test individual asset valuations and lives.

15. As set out in International Standard on Auditing (UK) 240: The auditor's responsibilities relating to fraud in an audit of financial statement, there is a presumed risk of fraud over the recognition of revenue. We have considered the risk that revenue may be misstated resulting in a material misstatement in the financial statements. We also considered the risk of fraud over expenditure, as most public bodies are net spending bodies, and the risk of external fraud (in accordance with Practice Note 10: Audit of Financial Statements and Regularity of Public Sector Bodies in the UK).

- 16. We have rebutted the presumption that a material risk exists, with the exception of management override, as noted above. This is on the basis that:
- There are generally no incentives for staff to commit fraudulent financial reporting
- A significant portion of the council's income comes from government grants and contributions that can readily be agreed to funding letters
- An effective control environment operates around income from council tax and non-domestic rates billing
- Income derived from fees and charges for the provision of services is well controlled with controls around access to financial systems, segregation of duties, and reconciliations that prevent and detect the risk of misstatement
- Most expenditure is in low-risk areas where individual transactions are wellcontrolled (for example salaried staff costs in a well-defined grading system) and individual transactions are relatively small in scale, with management or council approval required for material transactions
- Evidence of external fraud from counter fraud services and the National Fraud Initiative does not indicate material risk
- Experience in the sector and of the audit of Inverclyde Council, including a review of past misstatements, does not indicate material risk.
- **17.** Our audit testing is directed towards testing significant and unusual transactions and towards assessing accounting estimates to address any residual risk, as part of our standard fraud procedures. We have not, therefore, incorporated specific work into our audit plan in these areas over and above our standard audit procedures.

Other areas of audit focus

- 18. As part of our assessment of audit risks, we have identified other areas where we consider there are also risks of material misstatement to the financial statements. Based on our assessment of the likelihood and magnitude of the risk, we do not consider these to represent significant risks. We will keep these areas under review as our audit progresses. If our assessment of risk changes and we consider these risks to be significant, we will communicate this to management and those charged with governance and revise our planned audit approach accordingly.
- **19.** The areas of specific audit focus are:
- IAS19 net pensions liability: Actuarial estimates are a complex combination of liabilities over significant future periods based on life expectancy and CPI growth. These are subject to significant discounting based on corporate bond

rates. Assets are based on individual employer body shares of assets at last triennial valuation. Roll forward adjustments are provided to members data and to asset valuations.

- We will assess the scope, independence and competence of the professionals engaged in providing estimates for pensions and review appropriateness of actuarial assumptions and results including comparison with other councils. We will establish officer's arrangements for ensuring the reasonableness of professional estimations and the accuracy of information provided to the actuary by Inverclyde Council.
- **20.** We also note the significant changes at management and operational level, within the Council and the impact this may have on the financial statements. We do not plan any specific audit actions outwith our normal audit procedures but will continue to monitor the impact of these changes.

Group Consideration

- **21.** As group auditors, we are required under International Standard on Auditing (UK) 600: Audits of group financial statements (including the work of component auditors) to obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence on which to base our audit opinion on the group financial statements.
- 22. Inverclyde Council has a group which comprises component entities, including subsidiaries, associates and joint ventures. The audits of the financial information of some of the components are performed by other auditors. We plan to place reliance on the work of the component auditors. We will obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence in relation to the consolidation process and the financial information of the components on which to base our group audit opinion.

Audit risk assessment process

23. Audit risk assessment is an iterative and dynamic process. Our assessment of risks set out in this plan may change as more information and evidence becomes available during the progress of the audit. Where such changes occur, we will advise management and where relevant, report them to those charged with governance.

Audit dimensions and Best Value

Introduction

24. The Code of Audit Practice sets out the four dimensions that frame the wider scope of public sector audit. The Code of Audit Practice requires auditors to consider the adequacy of the arrangements in place for the audit dimensions in audited bodies.

Audit dimensions

25. The four dimensions that frame our audit work are shown in Exhibit 3.

26. In summary, the four dimensions cover the following:

- Financial management financial management is concerned with financial capacity, sound budgetary processes and whether the control environment and internal controls are operating effectively.
- Financial sustainability as auditors, we consider the appropriateness of the use of the going concern basis of accounting as part of the annual audit. We

will also comment on financial sustainability in the longer term. We define this as medium term (two to five years) and longer term (longer than five years).

- **Governance and transparency** governance and transparency is concerned with the effectiveness of scrutiny and governance arrangements, leadership, and decision-making and transparent reporting of financial and performance information.
- Value for money value for money refers to using resources effectively and continually improving services.

Best Value

- **27.** 2021/22 is the final year of the extended six-year approach to auditing Best Value in councils. Best Value work is integrated within the annual audit. It is to be assessed comprehensively over the period of the audit appointment, both through ongoing annual audit work and through discrete packages of work focussing on specific issues. Conclusions and judgements on Best Value will be reported through:
- the Annual Audit Report for each council that will provide a rounded picture of the council overall.
- an Annual Assurance and Risks Report that the Controller of Audit will provide to the Accounts Commission that will highlight issues from across all 32 council annual audit reports.
- a Best Value Assurance Report (BVAR) for each council that will be considered by the Accounts Commission at least once over the period of the audit appointment.

28. BVARs will be considered by the Accounts Commission between February and September 2022 on the councils listed in Exhibit 4.

29. The work planned in Inverclyde Council this year will focus on following up on the council's progress on recommendations identified in the Best Value Assurance Report published in June 2017. The results of this work will be reported in the Annual Audit Report.

Audit dimension risks

- 30. We have not identified any audit risks in relation to our wider dimensions work.
- **31.** We will follow up on the recommendations we made in our 2020/21 Annual Audit Report and report progress on delivering agreed actions in our 2021/22 Annual Audit Report.

Reporting arrangements, timetable, and audit fee

Reporting arrangements

- **32.** Audit reporting is the visible output for the annual audit. All Annual Audit Plans and the outputs, as detailed in Exhibit 5, and any other outputs on matters of public interest will be published on our website: www.audit-scotland.gov.uk.
- **33.** Matters arising from our audit will be reported on a timely basis and will include agreed action plans. Draft management reports will be issued to the relevant officers to confirm factual accuracy.
- **34.** We will provide an independent auditor's report to Inverslyde Council and the Accounts Commission setting out our opinions on the annual report and accounts. We will provide Invercive Council and the Accounts Commission with an annual report on the audit containing observations and recommendations on significant matters which have arisen during the audit.
- **35.** Exhibit 5 outlines the target dates for our audit outputs, and we aim to issue the independent auditor's report by 31 October 2022. We acknowledge this will be challenging due to the ongoing pressures and uncertainties caused by Covid-19.

Timetable

36. To support an efficient audit, it is critical that the timetable for producing the annual report and accounts for audit is achieved. We have included a proposed timetable for the audit at Exhibit 6 that has been discussed with management.

- **37.** Covid-19 has had a considerable impact on the conduct and timeliness of the audit. We recognise that it is in the best interests of public accountability to get the reporting of audited accounts back to pre-pandemic timelines. To this end, 2021/22 is a transition year with the reporting deadline brought forward by one month relative to the two prior years. We are identifying ways to work more efficiently to expedite the 2021/22 audits whilst at the same time maintaining high standards of quality.
- **38.** We will continue to work in close partnership with management with clarity over timescales and the requirement for high quality unaudited accounts and supporting working papers. Progress will be discussed with management and finance officers over the course of the audit.

Audit fee

- **39.** The agreed audit fee for the 2021/22 audit of Invercive Council is £265.340 (2020/21: £259,830). In determining the audit fee, we have taken account of the risk exposure of Inverclyde Council, the planned management assurances in place and the level of reliance we plan to take from the work of internal audit.
- **40.** Where our audit cannot proceed as planned through, for example, late receipt of unaudited annual report and accounts, the absence of adequate supporting working papers or being unable to take planned reliance from the work of internal

audit, a supplementary fee may be levied. An additional fee may also be required in relation to any work or other significant exercises out with our planned audit activity.

Other matters

Internal audit

- **41.** International standards on Auditing (UK) 610: Considering the work of internal audit requires us to:
- consider the activities of internal audit and their effect on external audit procedures;
- obtain an understanding of internal audit activities to inform our planning and develop an effective audit approach that avoids duplication of effort;
- perform a preliminary assessment of the internal audit function when there is scope for relying on internal audit work which is relevant to our financial statements' responsibilities; and
- evaluate and test the work of internal audit, where use is made of that work for our financial statements responsibilities to confirm its adequacy for our purposes.
- **42.** From our initial review of the internal audit plans, we do not plan to place formal reliance on internal audit's work for our financial statements' responsibilities. We do plan to consider the findings of Internal Audit across some areas of work including the Greenock Ocean Terminal project assurance review (brought forward from 20/21).

Independence and objectivity

- **43.** Auditors appointed by the Auditor General for Scotland or Accounts Commission must comply with the Code of Audit Practice and relevant supporting guidance. When auditing the financial statements, auditors must also comply with professional standards issued by the Financial Reporting Council and those of the professional accountancy bodies. These standards impose stringent rules to ensure the independence and objectivity of auditors. Audit Scotland has robust arrangements in place to ensure compliance with these standards including an annual 'fit and proper' declaration for all members of staff. The arrangements are overseen by the Director of Audit Services, who serves as Audit Scotland's Ethics Partner.
- **44.** The engagement lead (i.e. appointed auditor) for Inverclyde Council is Brian Howarth, Audit Director. Auditing and ethical standards require the appointed auditor to communicate any relationships that may affect the independence and objectivity of audit staff. We are not aware of any such relationships pertaining to the audit of Inverclyde Council.

Quality control

- **45.** International Standard on Quality Control (UK) 1 (ISQC1) requires a system of quality control to be established, as part of financial audit procedures, to provide reasonable assurance that professional standards and regulatory and legal requirements are being complied with and that the independent auditor's report or opinion is appropriate in the circumstances.
- **46.** The foundation of our quality framework is our Audit Guide, which incorporates the application of professional auditing, quality and ethical standards and the Code of Audit Practice (and supporting guidance) issued by Audit Scotland and approved by the Auditor General for Scotland. To ensure that we achieve the required quality standards, Audit Scotland conducts peer reviews and internal quality reviews. Additionally, the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Scotland (ICAS) have been commissioned to carry out external quality reviews.
- **47.** As part of our commitment to quality and continuous improvement, Audit Scotland will periodically seek your views on the quality of our service provision. We welcome feedback at any time, and this may be directed to the engagement lead.
